
The incorporation of migrant women into the labor force in Western industrialized countries has to be seen within the context of post crisis economy, progressive deindustrialization and dislocation of vertically concentrated, unionized factories and an increase of small production units which locate their labor through informal networks—immigrant ethnic enclaves—where the "unpaid work of women both as homeworkers and as household workers subsidizes the modern sector" (Pessar, this issue).

Women from the peripheral zones, to whom local production and dissolving economic sectors did not offer any more opportunities, represent a ready made labor supply which is, at once, the most vulnerable, the most flexible and, at least in the beginning, the least demanding work force. They have been incorporated into sexually segregated labor markets at the lowest stratum in high technology industries or at the "cheapest" sectors in those industries which are labor intensive and employ the cheapest labor to remain competitive.

In developing countries, the rapid growth in export manufacturing and in expert agriculture, based largely on foreign investments, provided poorly paid and insecure jobs for a new category of wage workers—very young women. Only U.S. off shore processing in electronics employs one-half million female workers (Sassen-Koob, this volume). Industrial employment is for them sometimes their first employment (Hancock, 1983), or, they first enter domestic service (the most "natural" employment opportunity for young women [Savane, 1980] in the agro-industry in Senegal). 






An estimated 47.9 PER CENT of the international migrant stock in mid-2019 were women.
















State of transnational migration studies from 2000s: inclusion of LGBT(Q) migrants





Towards a convergence: 'LGBT' and 'LGBTQ' in migration studies






State of transnational migration studies from 2000s: important impact of transnationalism perspective



Sum of Times Cited per Year











Family Tree **DNA** mtDNA Migrations Map






