Regulations governing the CAS and DAS Study Programs in International Law and Economics

The Faculty of Law at the University of Bern,

in application of Art. 2 (1) (d) and Art. 29 (a) of the Act governing the University of Bern of 5 September 1996 (Universitätsgesetz, UniG), and in addition to Art. 4, 43 and 77 to 80 of the Statute of the University of Bern of 7 June 2011 (Universitätsstatut, UniSt); the Weiterbildungsreglement der Universität Bern of 10 December 2013 (Weiterbildungsreglement, WBR);

after consideration by the Weiterbildungskommission;

adopts:

1. General

Subject	Art. 1 ¹ These regulations govern the Diploma of Advanced Studies in International Law and Economics (DAS ILE), and the Certificate of Advanced Studies in International Law and Economics (CAS ILE) within the framework of the general study program in international law and economics at the World Trade Institute (WTI).
	² The program is interdisciplinary and emphasizes the rules, regula- tions, and institutions, both domestic and international, that govern foreign trade, investment, and the operations of multinational enter- prise and other stakeholders in the global economy.
Governing Body	Art. 2 The continuing education programs of the CAS and DAS in in- ternational law and economics are carried out by the Academic Pro- gram Committee under the responsibility of the WTI. The structure of the program itself is subject to periodic and at least annual review by the Academic Program Committee of the WTI. The Academic Pro- gram Committee includes inter alia the WTI Managing Director, the Director of Studies, the CAS and DAS academic program coordinator, and academic program coordinators for other WTI programs.
Cooperation	Art. 3 Cooperation with institutions outside of the University of Bern is subject to separate cooperation agreements entered into by the Board of Directors (Universitätsleitung) of the University of Bern.

	The DAS ILE provides knowledge of the contemporary legal frame- work and the relevant underlying socio-economic and political econ- omy concepts for a set of topics as referenced in Art. 1. In this regard, the curriculum shall equip the DAS ILE students with the necessary analytical tools and knowledge of governing doctrines. ² CAS ILE		
	The CAS ILE programme with specialization offers an introduction to		
	the contemporary legal framework and the relevant underlying socio- economic and political economy concepts for a specific topic as refer- enced in Art. 1.		
Scope and Structure	Art. 6 ¹ DAS ILE with specialization		
	The DAS ILE with specialization is a non-consecutive diploma of 30 ECTS. The DAS program consists of the following elements:		
	 A minimum of 22 ECTS are obtained in course work. The course work is composed of weekly modules, advanced topic seminars, and research papers. A DAS ILE student shall complete 4-6 core courses, weekly modules, and advanced topic seminars. 		
	b 8 ECTS are awarded for a DAS ILE diploma paper.		
	c Subject to the approval from the WTI and based on the student's area of focus, students may define an area of specialization that will be defined in the diploma supplement given upon successful completion of the DAS program.		
	² CAS ILE with specialization		
	The CAS ILE with specialization is a non-consecutive certificate of 12 ECTS. The CAS program consists of the following elements:		
	 A minimum of 8 ECTS must be obtained in course work, research papers, and advanced topic seminars. 		
	<i>b</i> 4 ECTS are awarded for a CAS ILE certificate paper.		
	<i>c</i> Subject to the approval of the WTI and based on the student's area of focus, students may define an area of specialization that will be recognized in the certificate supplement given upon successful completion of the CAS program. This also allows students to complete more than one CAS at the WTI with a different focus of study for each CAS completed.

	a Students acquire thorough specialised knowledge in international law and economics with emphasis on the topics identified in Art. 1.	
	<i>b</i> Approved courses of study are defined in the DAS ILE study plan.	
	c With prior approval from the DAS academic program coordinator, the student may substitute related courses from other faculties pertaining to the program. In all cases, prior to commencing stud- ies, the student must obtain approval for the planned selection of courses from the DAS academic program coordinator.	
	d Courses that were already taken for a previous degree or title may not be part of the selection.	
	² CAS ILE	
	a Students acquire specialised knowledge in one specific area of in- ternational economic regulation with an interdisciplinary focus.	
	b The CAS ILE is awarded with a specialization, and approved courses of study, also known as specialization modules, are de- fined in the CAS ILE study plan.	
	<i>c</i> With prior approval from the CAS academic program coordinator, the student may substitute related courses from other faculties pertaining to the program. In all cases, prior to commencing studies for a particular module, the student must obtain approval for the planned selection of courses from the CAS academic program coordinator.	
	d Courses that were already taken for a previous degree or title may not be part of the selection.	
Teaching	Art. 8 ¹ The teaching staff is comprised of leading international experts from academia, private practice, international organisations, government and civil society organisations, as well as WTI staff with relevant experience and knowledge of the subject matter.	
	² The course work shall involve attendance and participation in courses, individual reading and studies, regular written and/or oral submissions and the preparation and submission of a written piece of research (diploma/certificate paper).	
Language	Art. 9 ¹ The language of instruction as well as the language of all written work is English, including all assessments and the diploma/certificate paper. Written assignments will be monitored to ensure academic integrity.	
	3. Admission [Eingefügt am 13. Dezember 2018]	
Admission	Art. 10 ¹ Admission to the CAS/DAS tracks is based on the evalua- tion of a complete application, made by the CAS/DAS Admissions Committee, which is appointed by the Academic Program Committee. Applications for the CAS are accepted on a rolling basis, with periods open 3 to 6 months before start of scheduled CAS offerings. When possible, Diploma admissions will be set to coincide with MILE and doctoral admissions. Applicants will be notified of admission within 6	

	weeks of the closing date for applications. Decisions on financial mat- ters, including fees and waivers, will be notified within 8 weeks. The WTI's Academic Program Committee may revise these dates.
	² Applicants must demonstrate outstanding academic ability and pro- vide credible references bearing witness to their research abilities.
	³ Applicants must have completed an undergraduate degree (or equiv- alent, depending on the educational system of the respective coun- try), ideally in a field related to the focus of the program, such as law, economics, finance, commerce, international relations, or political sci- ence.
	⁴ Applicants should possess at least one year of professional experi- ence in a related field (lawyer, diplomat, export industry representa- tive, trade economist, civil servant, etc.). Exceptions to this rule may be granted upon reviewing individual applications.
	⁵ Applicants must demonstrate an excellent command of written and spoken English. Students whose first language is not English are re- quired to provide TOEFL or IELTS test results. Exceptions may be granted on further examination, particularly where students have ob- tained their previous degree from a program conducted entirely in English. <i>[Fassung vom 13. Number of participants	Art. 11 A suitable number of students for the operation of CAS and DAS study programmes will be determined by the WTI's Operational Management. WTI's Academic Program Committee will decide on the selection of participants in each CAS and DAS based on the candidate's qualifications and on the evaluation made by CAS/DAS Admissions Committee.
	4. Conditions, Practical Examination and Graduation [Eingefügt am 13. Dezember 2018]
Requirements	Art. 12 ¹ Full attendance of classes is compulsory.
	² Dispensations and other exemptions to this rule are subject to approval by the academic program coordinator and are not subject to appeal.
	³ DAS and CAS students must secure a passing grade in their final grade average of courses taken in order to qualify for the CAS or DAS.
	⁴ DAS students must submit and secure a passing grade for their final diploma paper in order to qualify for the DAS.
	⁵ CAS students must submit and secure a passing grade for their final certificate paper in order to qualify for the CAS.
Assessment	Art. 13 ¹ All courses are assessed, and all need to be awarded a passing grade in order for credit to be granted.
	² Assessments can take the form of written assessments, oral assessments, or research papers, and may factor in class participation.
	³ Should a student receive a failing grade for his/her course assess- ment the student will be given the opportunity to take the exam again one time only.

⁵ Declaration of Authorship: All final certificate and diploma papers must include the following statement at the end of the paper along with the date and personal signature of the student:

"I hereby declare that I have written this work independently and that it is my own unaided work. The ideas and opinions expressed in this paper are made independently, represent my own views and are based on my own research. I have used no other sources than the ones I have specified. All sections that include direct or indirect sources have been properly acknowledged as references. I am aware that this thesis can be examined for the use of unauthorized aid and whether the thesis as a whole or parts incorporated in it may be deemed as plagiarism. I understand that failing to meet these requirements will result in a failing grade of '0' and that the Senate (pursuant to UniG Art. 36, para. 1, section r. of 5. September 1996 and Art. 69 of the UniSt of 7. June 2011) has the right to withdraw the conferred title. For the purposes of assessment and compliance concerning plagiarism. I grant the University of Bern the right to enter my work into a database where it shall also remain after examination, to enable comparison with future theses submitted. I understand that my thesis will be made available in the World Trade Institute library".

⁶ In cases where academic fraud is committed, the assessment shall be graded with a grade of 0. The highest academic standards apply to the CAS and DAS ILE programs, as set down in the Regulations concerning scientific integrity of 27 March 2007 / 30 April 2007 of the University of Bern; the Factsheet concerning Plagiarism, June 2012; the Guidelines of the University Board of Directors concerning the procedure for dealing with plagiarism, 28 August 2007 / 3 July 2012, as subsequently amended. In the event of more than one instance of academic fraud by a student, he or she will be expelled from the program. The Academic Program Committee may take further measures.
