

Virtual Gender Lecture "SPACE4WOMEN - CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES"

21 December 2020, 12:30-13:30

Abstract

Space4Women is a project of the United Nations Office for Outer Space Affairs (UNOOSA) to promote women's empowerment in space. To succeed in addressing the 17 Sustainable Development Goals and work towards the 2030 Agenda, it is required to ensure that the benefits of space reach women and girls and that women and girls play an active and equal role in space science, technology, innovation, and exploration.

In 2020, UNOOSA established the Space4Women Network which is a mentoring platform that promotes gender equality and gender empowerment in the space sector. Space4Women Network Mentors are selected from leaders and professionals in the space industry and represent a variety of fields and geographic regions. Space4Women encourages women and girls to pursue Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) education and raises awareness about career opportunities and the importance of gender equality and empowerment in the space sector.

The lecture focuses on discussing the situation of women in STEM related careers and education (particularly space science and technology related fields) the challenges faced by them, and the role of intergovernmental organizations such as United Nations Office for Outer Space Affairs (UNOOSA) and Asia Pacific Space Cooperation Organization (APSCO), in prompting and facilitating women in Space.

Ms Aisha Jagirani is currently working as the Director General of the Department of External Relations and Legal Affairs at Asia Pacific Space Cooperation Organization (APSCO).
