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trade versus culture: the onset of the battle

- post WW I origins: previous lower tradability of cultural products; European cinema vs Hollywood
- GATT 1947: screen quotas (art. IV)
- **CUSFTA 1988 / NAFTA 1993**
- symptomatic: the cultural exception argument is accepted; narrow focus on audiovisual media



trade versus culture: the clash

- the Uruguay Round (1986-1994)
- 'exception culturelle': exempt all culturerelated trade in services and goods from the WTO agreements
- still, focus on audiovisual services
- the 'agreement to disagree'
- GATS encompasses all services but substantial flexibilities built-in: positive committing for MA and NT; MFN exemptions
- audiovisual services: the least committed
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trade versus culture: forum-shopping

- from WTO to UNESCO
- from 'cultural exception' to 'cultural diversity'
- 2005 UNESCO Convention on Cultural **Diversity**
- critique: (i) lack of binding obligations; (ii) substantive incompleteness; and (iii) ambiguous relation towards other intérnational instruments
- soft rather than hard law





UNESCO Convention: impact

- vis-à-vis the WTO
 - formation of negotiation bloc unlikely
 - Doha talks
 - perpetuation of the status quo
 - China Audiovisual Products
- outside the WTO: bilateral and regional agendas of the US and the EU
- **UNESCO**: a flurry of activities, practical effect questionable?





international regime complexity

- multiple overlapping, non-hierarchical regimes
- starkly diverging positions of the EU and the US → ambiguity will persist
- greater uncertainty and unpredictability
- mismatch between 'trade and culture 1.0' rules and the transformed media landscape
- path dependence not advantageous for formulating future-oriented cultural policy
